Enoch Sweatt of lawful age doposes and  
say that my father Abraham T. Sweatt of Merri-  
mack in the County of Merrimack and State of New  
Hampshire was indebted to me in February  
1829, in the sum of three hundred dollars  
and over, and when I was at my father's in June  
last I let my father have one hundred dollars which  
was included in his note to me of four hundred  
dollars and I further state that at the time  
last above stated I made a present to my father  
of forty dollars in cash for which I took no security  
October 22. 1830. - Enoch Sweatt

dated June 23<sup>rd</sup> 1830 for the sum of four  
hundred dollars which was secured to  
me by mortgage of his real estate dated October  
22<sup>nd</sup> 1830. I further state that I have let my  
father have money at other times which  
is not included in the above named Note of  
\$400,-  
October 22<sup>nd</sup> 1830.

And the said *Abraham G. Swett* doth here in Court further declare on oath that he served in the Revolutionary War, as follows, viz.

*entered in the year 1777 in the month of April for three years under Lieut. Mast of Col. Scammels Regt and Scammels Company Gen. Boos Brigade and at the whole period of time and then discharged by Gen. Livermore at West Point, and the same discharge now at Secretarys Office was in the Battle of Fort Ann also at the Battle taking Burgoin and in a Battle with the Indians with Sullivan*

That the date of his original declaration in order to obtain a pension is *Friday April 1818*. And the number of his pension certificate is *10963*. That his occupation is *Farmer*. That the number and names of his family residing with him, and their ages and capacities to contribute to their support, are as follows, viz.

*his wife Priscilla aged fifty eight very unhealthy, one child Enock aged 18 years unhealthy and himself aged sixty and very much troubled with the Rheumatism and unable to support his family without assistance from his Country*

Wherefore he prays the opinion of the said Court as to the value of the property contained in the said Schedule, and that the same together with a copy of the premises be duly certified, to the Secretary of War.

Sworn and declared before *Hon. Joshua Darling & J. H. Smith Justices of said County* the *11<sup>th</sup>* day of *July 1820*.

of Willsborough and State of New-Hampshire.

Abraham L. Swett 1820 July 11<sup>th</sup> aged 51 years resident in Bradford  
in said County, comes into Court, and, in pursuance of an Act of Congress, passed on the 1st day of May,  
1820, brings with him, and in his proper person, exhibits to said Court a Schedule by him subscribed, containing his whole  
estate, and income, (his necessary clothing and bedding excepted) as follows:

oath, by him duly taken and subscribed, viz

I Abraham L. Swett do solemnly swear that I was a resi-  
dent citizen of the United States on the 18th of March, 1818; and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any  
manner disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it, as to bring myself within  
the provisions of an Act of Congress, entitled "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service  
of the United States, in the Revolutionary War," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has  
any person in trust for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts, due to me, nor have I any income other than  
what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed.

Sir:

In reply to your communication received June 29, 1905, you are advised that Abraham Titcomb Sweatt applied for a pension April 7, 1818, as a resident of Bradford, N. H., formerly of Bosquoin, N. H., and fifty-eight years of age.

He stated that he enlisted in April 1777, and served one year as a Private and two years as a Corporal under Captain Scammel, Lieutenant Cass, in Colonel Scammel's 3rd regiment of the New Hampshire line. He was in the battle of Fort Ann, taking of Burgoyne, and under Sullivan against the Indians, discharged April 19, 1780, at West Point, N. Y., by Captain D. Livermore.

His claim was allowed under the Act of March 18, 1818, but discontinued July 31, 1820, under the Act of May 1, 1820, which act provided that ever service pensioner should exhibit a schedule of his whole estate and income (clothing and bedding excepted) upon which the Secretary of War should determine whether in his opinion the soldier was in such indigent circumstances as to be unable to support himself without assistance of his country.

In 1820, soldier mentioned his wife Priscilla, aged fifty-eight, and son Enoch, eighteen years.

He continued to file evidence under the Act of March 1, 1823, upon which his name was restored to the rolls February 11, 1831, as

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"unable to support himself without assistance of his country."

He also had a son Samuel, living in 1830, age not stated.
